The post was created in December 1940 and named in honor of General [Leonard Wood](#) (former Chief of Staff) in January 1941." The token's owner reports, "Memories of Army basic here, before PCS to Ft. Lewis & then 'Nam."
 Right: 1965 Western Washington (Puyallup) Fair 50-cent souvenir coin/token. According to the owner, the Fair may have only issued these souvenirs for one year.

 Center: Olympia Brewing Company stock certificate, dated 06-30-72.

KM# 192, 1.09 grams, .220 silver, ruler Nicolaus Friedrich Peter, mintage 1,020,000.
Accorded to the owner, "Oldenburg, Germany, is where my ancestral tree originates.
First coin I've ever run across from there!"



Left: Alderbrook Golf and Yacht Club token. Obverse and reverse are the same. This has been shown to members at the club, and no one had ever seen one before.
Center/right: Olympia Transit Co. transportation token, GOOD FOR ONE FARE.

and \$100 United States Note (1966).







Silver proof medal from Germany. The obverse features Martin Luther (1483-1546). The reverse features the Frauenkirche in Dresden, Germany. This 18th century Lutheran church was destroyed by allied bombing in WW II. The ruins were left for 50 years as a war memorial, following the decisions of local East German leaders. After the reunification of Germany, the church was rebuilt. It was rededicated in 2005.

1875-1880 real estate mortgage bond coupon in the amount of \$17.50, printed by the National Bank-Note Company for the Equitable Trust Company in New York City. (Bond was issued on 1 May 1875 and the coupon redeemed/cancelled on 1 May 1880.)
